In a recent session of the Trumpet Duplicate Bridge Club, the above hand was played in several contracts which included 5D, 4H, and this one in 3 NT.

A 5 diamond bid is practically an unstoppable contract, conceding only a spade and a heart trick to West. However, let's observe the 3 NT contract for a good lesson about what not to do. 3 NT is an unsound bid by South, for if North had no club stopper, the hand would be set back one trick.

Irregular as it may seem, North-South arrived at a 3 NT bid. The spade king was led by West, who captured two spade tricks from the top. South can see only eight tricks from the top, and to secure the contract, attempts to steal a heart trick by leading to king after taking the third round of spades. West will not permit such a bargain and cashes the ace of hearts and the two good spades to defeat the contract by one.

The proper play of the hand is not to squeeze the heart at trick four, but instead to attack with diamonds. Employing the squeeze against West, South is able to place West in discard trouble after the fifth round of diamonds.

The result of a spade sluff by West would assure South of one more trick, which would complete the 3 NT contract.

Theobald Puts Minds To Rest

Looking every bit like Peter Sellers in one of his earlier comedy roles, Robert Theobald kept the campus thinking for three days this past week.

Theobald, lecturer and writer who is best known for his promo-

tion of the guaranteed income concept, lectured to numerous classes and was the featured speaker for the Monday night Happening-

Concert Lecture Series.

Monday was the highlight of his visit as he spoke to a capacity crowd at the National Guard Armory. His subject, "The Individual in the Society of the Future," was broad enough to include his predictions on the effects of cybernation and the ethical implications of the guaranteed income proposal.

Tuesday morning he told Mrs. Gustafson's statistics class that there would be "little need for statistics as we know them in the future."

He related the implications of automation to communications, and suggested the revolution that could be caused in politics with the advent of instantaneous opinion polls from every citizen.

Theobald showed a genuine interest in student opinion and a willingness to discuss any topic brought before him.

At his suggestion, an informal discussion was held in the Orange lounge Tuesday night.
