Tuition Fees Afforded To Rising Cost Of Education

The Administration of St. Andrews is seeking to provide an educational opportunity at the lowest possible costs which will afford high quality instruction and comfortable student facilities", says Mr. Elias Vaughn.

The rising cost of tuition and fees cover only part of the instructional and operating cost of the college. The difference between student cost and operating cost must be met by college income, that is from endowments, church contributions, and gifts from friends of the college.

Last year the business office approximated the cost of living for an average student on campus to be around the figure \$250. Under influence from the Ford Foundation, was decided to establish a guaranteed fee which would be effective for four years, realizing however, that some supplement from other sources would have to be used to cover the student's total

cost. At the same time, although tuition would be raised, no one would be refused admittance on a financial basis.

In the past five years, the tuition for an incoming freshmen has risen more than 75%. The student is informed that his money is divided into categories of tuition, room, and board.

In a recent survey of salaries paid to professors, St. Andrews obtained a drafting. This is an improvement over previous E and F ratings received by our school. "It is the school's aims to double the now present salaries within the next ten years," says Mr. Vaughn.

Mr. Vaughn also stated that the main cause of the constantly rising tuition may be directed towards the attainment of a more stable and academically sound faculty.

New Blue Scholarship

The John Blue Scholarship Fund, aimed at helping students with leadership ability, is a \$30,000 fund being given by John Blue, Laurinburg Manufacturer whose farm machinery company is now based in Huntsville, Ala.

President Moore noted that this is the third large gift made to St. Andrews by the Laurinburg-Huntsville philanthropist.

Mr. Massey To Assist Admissions

Appointment of the Rev. William Massey of Laurel Hill as assistant director of admissions for St. Andrews Presbyterian College was announced recently by President Wesley C. Moore.

Now pastor of the Church in the Pines (Presbyterian) at Laurel Hill, Rev. Mr. Massey has worked with St. Andrews students during his four-year pastorate, both in his church's program and on campus. He has also been involved in the presbytery's camps and conferences.

In his new post he will be assisting Rober W. Decker, dean of admissions, in counseling prospective students.

A graduate of Duke University, the Rev. Mr. Massey took the master of forestry degree there in 1951 and then served four years as a naval aviator.

He took his bachelor of divinity degree from Union Theological Seminary in Richmond, Va., and his first pastorate was at Cross Roads Presbyterian Church at Mebane.

Parents' Registration Opens Full Day Campus Activities

At least 500 parents are expected on campus tomorrow to participate in the annual Parent's Day activities.

The all-day event will be preceded this evening by the first meeting of the St. Andrews Alumni Council and by the last performance of "The Boy Friend" for which tickets are still available. All tickets for tomorrow's performance were sold last week.

Saturday's activities will get underway with registration of parents from 9:00-10:00 a. m. in the main lounge of the Student Center.

At 10:15 a. m., a dialogue discussion with Dr. W. D. White and Rev. Robert F. Davenport will be conducted in the liberal arts auditorium. A question-and-answer

period for parents will be a feature of this program. Floor microphones will be provided to facilitate the asking of questions.

Students who do not have parents attending will be given box lunches at 11:30 a. m. They are asked to eat on the west side of the lake. From there they will be able to watch the boat races, beginning at 12 noon.

Bleachers for parents and their students will be available on chapel island.

Luncheon for visiting parents and the student members of their families will be served in the cafeteria at 1:15 p.m. Seating will be in the main lounge of the Student Center, alcove, snack bar, and main lounge of the Student Center. Over 800 persons are expected to attend this luncheon.

Remote speakers will be placed in all rooms to carry the pro-

gram which will follow the luncheon. Dean Robert F. Davidson will preside, and Dr. Joe N. Davis, Jr., Parents' Day chairman, will present a questionnaire. Dr. David is the father of sophomore Amy Davis.

The annual bike race sponsored by Kings Mountain dorm will be held Saturday afternoon.

Our soccer team will play Pfeiffer College at 2:00 p. m. on the main athletic field.

Faculty advisors will be available for consultation with parents in the main lounge of the Student Center at 2:30 p. m.

The concluding event of the day will be the final performance of "The Boy Friend" at 8:00 p. m. in the liberal arts auditorium.

Ten members of the St. Andrews chapter of the Kiwanis Key Club will serve as couriers and guides during the day's events. Manning registration tables will be staff members of the development and alumni office.

The meeting of the Alumni Council will begin tonight at 6:30 p. m., in the small dining room of the Student Center. Miss Peggy Shinn, president, will preside.

The council will hear a report by the chairman of the annual giving committee, Dr. Darius Flincham. He will present a challenge opportunity that has been made available for the St. Andrews alumni annual giving campaign.
