

Maxon, Grier and Dean Leake were the only victors in the return match Tuesday night. Leake won a decision while the others pinned their Wilmington opponents.

### SA Kegglers Remain On Top In DIAC

With a brilliant first half performance, the Knight kegglers have pushed into a three point lead in the DIAC conference standings.

The Knights will travel to Methodist College in Fayetteville this coming Wednesday in a decisive match with the fourth place Methodist squad.

Anchor man Ed Butterworth for the Knights is presently tied for top individual average with Paul Dhyse of Methodist, both with a 190 plus average. Frank Ligon and John Burchil, carrying 185 and 175 respectively, are both placed in the league's top ten

Day student Bill Padgett has joined the team this semester and is expected to boost the squad's 875 game average by ten sticks.

By dropping 3 out of 4 points against Charlotte, the Knights have fallen into a tie with College of Charleston for first place. The SA bowlers rolled a solid 954 set in the first game with Frank Ligon leading the squad with a 197. In the second and third games, the '49ers bounced back and won both while capturing the match point. John Burchill led the kegglers with a 552 set.
