March 4 St. Andrews students are invited to the Christian Action Conference sponsored by Fayetteville Presbytery to be held in the Student Center from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Elder James McBride Dabbs will lecture on "The Church and the Race Problem." Mr. Dabbs has served on the faculties of the University of South Carolina and Coker College. At the latter he was head of the English Department. He presently lives at Maysville, South Carolina. Dabbs has written over a hundred articles on domestic relations, especially race relations, for such magazines as CHRISTIAN CENTURY.

Following this address, Dr. Rudoph Jones will moderate a discussion on Dabbs' lecture. Jones is an elder in Fayetteville Presbytery and president of Fayetteville State College.

Dr. Merle D. Patterson has recently left the ministry to work with the office of Economic Opportunity in Atlanta, Georgia. Hewi speak on "The Christian Witnes amid Affluence and Poverty."


