Who's Who Announced At Awards Ceremony, 16 Seniors Receive National Recognition

Sixteen nominees to WHO'S WHO AMONG STUDENTS IN AMERICAN UNIVERSITIES AND COLLEGES from St. Andrews were announced last night at Awards Night.

The following seniors are the new members to WHO'S WHO from SA:

Ted Foy, an English major from Winston-Salem, was President of the Student Center Board and a member of the student cabinet. He has been named to the Dean's List and is president of the Honor Society. He has been awarded a fellowship towards his Ph. D. at the University of Delaware. Ted is married to the former Joyce Collins of Winston-Salem.

Mary Raine Sydnor, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clem Sydnor, Jr., of Lynchburg, Va., is a philosophy and religion major and was secretary of the Student Judiciary Board her senior year. She served on the Interdormitory council as dorm president her junior year and has been in the college choir all of her years at SA.

Kay McClanahan of Herndon, Va., is president of the Highland Players and vice-president of her dormitory. She also served as senior member of the Student-Faculty Appellate Board. Majoring in drama, she is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph P. Hutcheson.

Bob Anderson, a history major, and the outgoing Student Body President, plans to continue his study of International Affairs with an emphasis on African Studies at graduate school in the fall. Decker Fills Vacated Dean's Office

Dean of Admissions Rodger W. Decker said this week that he considered his appointment as Assistant Dean of the College for Student Affairs as a "significant challenge" in which he would "try very hard to do a good job."

Dean Decker explained that his impressive new title entails, among other things, assuming the duties previously borne by the Dean of Students. He said his approach to student affairs could be succinctly expressed:

"I believe firmly in student government, student freedom, and

presenting a situation where students can grow and mature. I believe equally firmly in the other side of the equation which can be summarized in one word -- responsibility. You can't have one without the other."

Dean Decker continued that he considered the polar extremes of a no-holds-barred policy or an administrative dictatorship equally repulsive.

"Rules and regulations can provide good guidelines, but God gave man a brain to think with and horse sense is a good asset."

Asked what he thought his obligation to the individual is in the context of his new role, Dean Decker said that it was to make the total college experience a success. "I must be friend, counselor, adviser, and must be willing to go to bat for students and alert to their suggestions; also a catalytic agent between various student groups, bringing student life programs in harmony with academic life programs.

He indicated that his responsibility to the student body as a whole included the same obligations, as they are in harmony with the basic programs and purposes of the college.

"The opportunities for developing student life programs here are limitless," Dean Decker said.
