## Knights Among Schools In NAIA Playoffs, Second Half Surge Puts SA In Contention

The Knights finished the 1967 season with an 11-14 record, still good enough to get an NAIA playoff bid. St. Andrews ended the season with a 16-9 loss to the Baptist College of Charleston.

Playing under the lights, "the Knight nine was simply out hit", said Coach Gerald Griffin. Highlights for the Knights were run-producing doubles by Gay and Broach. The Baptist Buccaneers hit Gregory for nine runs in the third inning and a string of relievers followed for the Knights. The marathon lasted four hours.

Batting in the top of the eighth, Jim Timmons, second sacker, loated a pitch into right field which carried over the fence for a home run. With two aboard, this three run rout finished the scoring for the game against Campbell College of Bales Creek.

For St. Andrews, this was the second straight shutout against the Campbell Camels. Freshman Leroy Broach played an excellent

game at shortstop, credited with six assists, while Timmons led the Knights at the plate with two hits in four times at bat.

Wayne Nunn of the Pembroke Braves handed St. Andrews their first defeat in their last six outings. Tom Thorn smashed a single, the only Knight to hit during the game. The Braves tagged Knight pitcher Kemp Gregory in the bottom of the first for a single tally, but SA retaliated with a run in the top of the second. The Braves iced the game with three runs in the fifth inning to defeat SA 6-1. Collins of Pembroke led the hitting, going three for four at the plate.

The Knights returned an early season shellacking, downed by Wilmington 21-9, but shutting them out 3-0 behind the ace hurling of Dodson. St. Andrews scored three runs in the first on a double by center fielder Kell Gay.

Continuing their road trip, the Knights pounded the Hornets of Lynchburg for four runs in both

the first and the fourth innings. Sticks in the game were Skip Tredlick, Al Thompson, Timmons, and Broach. Gregory pitched the distance and won handily 10-4, giving the Hornets three unearned runs.

The St. Andrews bowling team finished its season this past weekend by placing second in the NAIA regional tournament. Their 5361 pin total fell far short of powerful West Virginia State's 5534 thirty

game total. The NAIA tournament is bowled on a mailing basis. Each school may enter eight bowlers, the top five scorers for the six game bout counting as entries for their college.

West Virginia, by winning the district VII title, will participate in the finals in Kansas City, Missouri this month.

The Knights team rolled slightly

better than their season average the tournament, which resulted in an improved position in the district finals, bettering last year's fifth place finish.

Leading the team was sophomore Frank Ligon, who rolled consecutive sets of 554 and 593 for a 1147 pin total. Behind Ligon were John Barchill (1065), Ed Butterworth (1069), Bill Padgett (1010) and Joe Janod (960).

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
