

Keglers Win 67-68 Action With Record 34-6 Mark; Burchill's 608 Top Set

Overwhelming their Charleston opponents last weekend by a score of 2637-2330, St. Andrews' Knights set an unprecedented 34-6 conference record to win their second straight DIAC title.

Leading the keglers over second place Charleston College was senior co-captain John Burchill who fired the league's highest set, a 608 with games of 225, 189, 194. The robust exhibition was Burchill's first competition 600 series in his three years for St. Andrews. In '66 he fired a 636 set in DIAC tournament competition.

The record setting season's climax held another first for St. Andrews' lanemen. Coach Dave McLean worked all nine members of his squad into active competition, a feat not usually accomplished during the entire regular season.

With his 608 performance, Burchill's average ascended to 179.23, third in the DIAC, bettered only by Charleston's Bob Wittchen (185), and St. Andrews' Ed Butterworth 179.45. The Knight's Rodney Ferguson, who transferred at the semester, finished with a 179.83, but is ineligible for top rank in the season's statistics.

The locale of the DIAC tournament on March 1 and 2 has

been switched from Rocky Mount, North Carolina to Laurinburg, home of St. Andrews keglers. Tentatively the team event will take place Friday March 1 at 3:30, followed on Saturday by the doubles and singles events.

St. Andrews' Burchill and Butterworth are currently defending a two year doubles crown.

well Night to honor the former basketball star, now Assistant Director of Admissions and coach in soccer, basketball and tennis. The Club's President, Brian Weger, presented Brockwell a plaque at halftime.

St. Andrews faced off against the N.C. Wesleyan Bishops on the first night of the tournament. After trailing 43-34 at halftime, Boyd called for the press. Halfway through the second half St. Andrews had caught and gone ahead of Wesleyan 61-55. Boyd said later of his decision to use the press: "I felt we could pressure them into losing the ball because they didn't handle the ball as well as, say, Lynchburg. Against Greensboro I moved the team into a press hoping to keep them from using it against us."

Hannas dropped in 31 points against the Bishops (10 field goals and 11 for 12 from the foul line) and gathered in 20 rebounds as he led his teammates to the 88-76 victory. During the three games he pulled down 46 rebounds and led in this category as well as the scoring. Darden of Methodist was second with 42.

Lynchburg bombed College of Charleston on the first night 77-55. McKinney was the leading scorer for the Hornets with 21 while Charleston could only put one man in double figures Gerald Lominac had 15.

In the semi-final round Lynchburg bested Methodist

College by a score of 88-60. The Hornets had control of the game throughout as they piled up an early lead and led at half-time 34-14. Again McKinney led his teammates in the scoring column; this time with 22. Darden collected 24 points after a poor performance against Charlotte the night before. He got only 7 points as his teammates carried him and beat U.N.C. at Charlotte, 76-71. Dave Bowman and Johnson Murray had 23 and 20 points respectively for the Monarchs of Methodist.

Greensboro and Methodist took the hardwood on Saturday night for the Consolation title. It proved to be the high scoring game of the tournament as Greensboro won, 100-87. Seven players were in double figures for the night.

Darden contributed 36 points in a losing cause as another Monarch, Jim Brown, added 22. Radford was high for Greensboro with 30. Bill Salmon had 17, Randy Hunter 16, Dean Oldham 19, and Stan Morgan

closed out the double figure scoring with 16. Darden's 36 was the high single scoring performance of the tourney.

Boyd emphasized that the victory was a result of "our bench." He said it was "the strongest in the league. I could count on any one of nine or ten of them going out on the court and doing a good job." When queried about the two come from behind victories over Wesleyan and Greensboro, Boyd replied that it was "a combination of the full press and 1-3-1 zone defense. That defense upset our opponents and helped crack their scoring attack."

This year's tennis team has a bright future according to head coach Benny Brockwell. A lot of talent returns from last year's court battles as well as several bright new prospects who are at St. Andrews for their first year. The 2nd Annual Campbell Invitational comes early in the competition as St. Andrews journeys to Bites Creek

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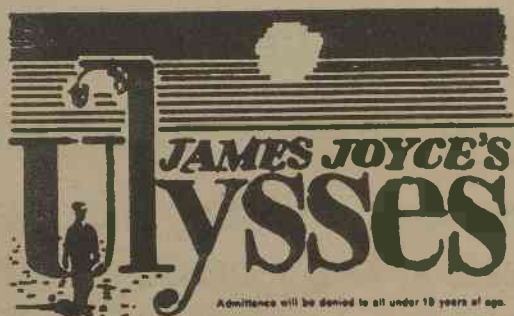
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
