The 1969-70 basketball season came to a close for the Knights with Tuesday's Dis-trict 29 tournament loss to Campbell. The Blue Machine's final record was 17-9.

all began in late October and the Knights suffered from a lack of valuable conditioning time because the Harris Courts were in a state of repair. As it turned out the faulty gym floor was not ready until January 10th forcing the Knights to play their first six games on their op-ponent's courts.

After three straight defeats the hoopsters rebounded with victories in their next four outings, all against conference rivals. The Knight attack was carried by the consistent play of guards Gary Gredlein and John Turner, Gredlein's ball hawking and aggressive de-fensive play combined with Turner's consistent shooting and the rebounding of Craig Hannas were vital in there early season victories.

The latter portion of January found the hoopsters in a mild slump and they ended the month with a .500 slate of 7-7. It appeared that the team suffered from a split personality as the looked invincible in some games but failed to maintain this success formula on the road.

February characterized the entire Knight season as it began with the team reacting top form and ended with agonizing defeat in tournament competition at Lynchburg. The hoopsters

completed the regular season winning seven of their eight contests. This late season success was due largely to the fine play of raleigh senior Brent Rhue. Rhue reached his physical peak and became a regular starter. He joined Hannas bolstering the Knights rebounding strength and inside offensive attack and was instrumental in igniting the fastbreak with Gredlein and Turner.

The Knights entered the DIAC Tournament as the regular season conference victors. The road jinx returned, however, and tournament host Lynchburg upset its favored Knight's in the semi-final round.

Spencer Boyd's hoopsters performed admirably after a slow start. Selecting an MVP is an impossible chore as the Knight's major weapon was certainly their balanced attack. The starting five, Gredlein, Turner, Rhue, Hannas, and Gary Linn all averaged in double figures for the season. In fact, it seemed that with each game a different player provided the spark for victory. Tony Fernandez, Ven Johnson, and Joe Long turned in valuable substitute and occasional spot start performances for the hoopsters. reshmen Richie Robinson, Stuart Eutsler, and Miles Weaver saw limited action but showed potential for the future.

It seems fitting to note that oth Turner and Rhue ended their SA basketball careers with their best season performances in varsity competition.

Led by Sophomore John Bryon, the bowlers won the second and third games to salvage a tie after being routed in the first game by the strong Lynchburg five. Captain Ralph Nesbit, Margo Ligon, Rick Skutch, and Chuck Hardesty helped lead the comeback. Conference Individual leader, Bart Fugler paced the Hornets as he rolled a 540 series. This match brings the Knights record to 19-17.

Although this year's record is a far cry from last year's record setting 34-6, the 1969-1970 keglers have turned in commendable performances. The average team score is 836 which is only 14 pins less than that of the Conference Champthat of the Conference Champions of 168-69.
