Faculty Approves The Entire Code

On Tuesday afternoon, the faculty at its monthly meeting acted on the Code of Responsibility and elected new faculty members to the Faculty Executive Committee.

The group approved without discussion the Code of Responsibility as passed by the Senate. Included in the Code was the following statement which was passed in the IDS two weeks ago.

"The development of deep personal relationships between men and women is expected and encouraged at St. Andrews. Sexual intercourse should be an aspect of and only in the context of a personal relationship which has the depth of lifetime commitment by both parties, symbolized in our society by legal marriage. It is also recognized that such relationships are essentially personal and private and that those involved must assume responsibility for them. Nevertheless, premarital or extramarital sexual intercourse which makes use of college facilities, or which, by becoming public knowledge, reflects adversely on the entire community, is subject to appropriate disciplinary action."

The Code will be presented to the students after Easter for a vote, and, if passed, will go

to the Board of Trustees at their April meeting.

The faculty also chose five of its members to serve on the FEC. They are Dr. Charles Joyner, Mr. J. D. Holmes, Dr. Douglas Hix, Dr. Malcolm Doubles, and Dr. William Rolland. They along with students Wilburn Hayden, Sam Sutton, and Louis Swanson will constitute

Dorm Autonomy Statement

(The following interpretation of individual dorm responsibility was submitted by the Student Faculty Appellate Board on Monday.)

"Dorm autonomy was only the recognition of the need for dorms to be able to determine their own practices on situations that are appropriate specifically to them, in line with policies approved by the IDS. Dorm autonomy was not meant to presuppose that the IDS would act as a rubber stamp to any and all proposals made by the Dorm Councils. Due to the apparent lack of communication among all levels of campus government organization, we interpret from the Constitution of the Student Association the following procedure as a necessary organizational guide-line."

Visiting Philosopher To Come Monday

Dr. William Augustus Banner, Professor of Philosophy at Howard University, will visit the SA campus on Monday as part of the Piedmont Visiting Lecture Series. SA, as a mem-

ber of that program, has invited Dr. Banner to speak on campus under the auspices of Senior C&C and the Department of Religion and Philosophy.

There will be a public lecture Monday at 11:00 a.m. in the Liberal Arts Building to which all interested students are invited, and a banquet at 6 p.m. hosted by the Department of Religion and Philosophy.

Dr. Banner, previous to his position at Howard University, held Visiting Professorships at Yale, 1954-55, Smith College, 1958-59, U. of Colorado, summer 1963, Yale, 1964-65, and the University of Rhode Island, summer 1965, 1968.

Dr. Banner has several publications to his credit including "Natural Law and Social Order", in "The Return to Reason", 1953, "Origen and The Tradition of Natural Law Concepts", 1954, and "Ethics: An Introduction to Moral Philosophy", 1968.
