The fifth Annual South and West Literary Festival, sponsored by South and West, Inc., was held in Pine Bluff, Arkansas October 30 through November 1. Mr. Ronald Bayes, Author of "History of the Turtle", and three student poets, Todd Davis, John Lawson and Jean Carr, represented St. Andrews at the festival.

The festival was composed of a series of readings, symposiums, workshops, lectures and seminars. Mr. Bayes lectured on "The Modern Japanese Novel." The student representatives prepared a seminar on "The College Magazine." The four representatives from St. Andrews made up not only the majority of North Carolina representatives, but also the majority of student writers at the festival.

Their attendance at the festival has helped to create lines of communication between North Carolina, and specifically St. Andrews, and factions of the literary world throughout the southeastern United States.

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Peace Corps Helps Boy Scouts, Tutees

I am proud to report that the St. Andrews Peace Corps is running strong regardless of our problems in finances and transportation. We have approximately seventy student volunteers involved in the Peace Corps this year of which over half are freshmen. Several faculty members and their wives have become both directly and indirectly involved.

Two new programs have been added to the list this year: A boy Scout troop and academic tutoring. The scout troop is serving twenty-two boys from the Carolina Park area. Led by their fearless scoutmaster, John Haluska, they learn how to tie knots, play games and all kinds of useful crafts and skills. There are five students serving as assistant scoutmasters. All were once scouts.

Seven students are involved in academic tutoring at South Scotland Elementary School. These students work closely with the teacher and give individual attention to pupils who are slow in keeping up with the rest of the class.

The art workshop is a big suc-

cess this year. Every Saturday afternoon at 2:00 thirty-two kids invade the art department for instructions in arts and crafts. Ginny Tebo is coordinating this program and she has eight volunteers helping her.

We have sixteen students involved in after-school tutoring which has always been a big program in the Peace Corps. Other programs are Story Hour and a growing Juvenile Probation program.

Due to a severe decrease in our budget the Peace Corps has not been able to function in as many areas as hoped. Over half of our money is being spent in the use of school facilities such as the rental of the activity bus and P. E. facilities. There is a chance that the Peace Corps will not be able to function at all next semester because of finances.

Highland Players Offer Trial Drama Next Week

Inherit The Wind, a courtroom drama by Jerome Lawrence and Robert E. Lee will be presented by the Highland Players at the Liberal Arts Auditorium November 12 through 15.

Using the famous Scopes' trial of the twenties, Lawrence and Lee have written a play which is loaded with all of the action of the court room. As John Scopes, the center of the controversy of teaching evolution, died last month, the Players' production has become very timely.

The play has historical basis, although the authors have changed the names of the characters. The characters and their real historical figures are Mathew Harrison Brady (William Jennings Bryan), Henry Drummond (Clarence Darrow) and Bertram Cates (John Scopes).

Howard Cobbs is directing the Players' second production of the season. Arthur McDonald, scene designer, has built the town of Hillsboro (Dayton, Ten-

nessee) for the stage.

Award Winning Poet Stafford To Read In Avinger Tuesday

William Stafford, Poetry Consultant to the Library of Congress, National Book Award winner for poetry for "Travelling Through the Dark", will read his own work at the Avinger Auditorium at 7 p.m., Tuesday, November 10.

Stafford, until his appointment to the Library of Congress, served as Chairman of the English Department at Lewis and Clark College in Oregon. His fourth book, "Allegiances", was published by Harper and Row last year and he will be featured in the third issue of "St. Andrews Review".

Stafford's other books include "West of Your City" and "The Rescued Year".

Kansas was Stafford's home for his early years. He is a Ph.D. in Creative Writing from the State University of Iowa. Many consider him the most authentically American poet since Robert Frost.

Dr. Stafford is a Quaker and has participated in many peace marches and read-ins against the Viet Nam War. Like Brother Antoninus he was interned in a camp for conscientious objectors during World War II. He is married and the father of four.
