Paxton New Economics Professor; Pedigo, Weimer, Smith Promoted

Appointment of a new faculty member and promotion of three current members was announced this week by Dean Victor C. Arnold of St. Andrews Presbyterian College. The actions were formally approved by the St. Andrews Board of Trustees at its recent spring meeting.

Dr. Robert A. Pedigo, now Mary Reynolds Babcock Associate Professor of Biology, was promoted to full professor. Dr. Donald G. Paxton, now at Old Dominion University, will join the faculty this fall as associate professor of economics. Two instructors, Mark L. Smith in art and George W. Weimer in music, were named assistant professors.

Dr. Pedigo joined the St. Andrews faculty in 1967 after seven years as a William and Mary faculty member. In 1968 he became chairman of the Division of Mathematics and Natural Science.

A graduate of Butler University with M.S. and Ph.D. from Emory University, Pedigo has been a participant in the National Science Foundation's Visiting Scientist program and a radiation biology consultant for NASA.

Dr. Paxton, a 34-year-old native of Granite, Oklahoma, is a graduate of Oklahoma State University where he majored in personnel management. He also received his Master of Science in economics there and last year earned his Ph.D. at Tulane University. He was an instructor at Loyola University for two years before joining the Old Dominion faculty in 1968.

At the Norfolk institution he has been active in the faculty and university senate. He is co-author with J.W. Nickson of "A Study Guide for Nickson's Economics and Social Choice." He also has authored a number of research reports for Virginia cities on projects funded

by the Omnibus Crime Control Act.

Dr. Rodney Fulcher, chairman of the Division of History and Social Sciences, said that Paxton would, in addition to economics courses, teach as a member of the junior and senior year Christianity and Culture teams. He will lecture on problems of economic development in the junior course, Intercultural Studies of the Third World, and in the senior course, Future Studies.

Smith, a native of Cleveland, Ohio, joined the St. Andrews faculty in 1970. He received his Bachelor of Fine Arts at Miami University of Ohio and held a teaching fellowship while earning his M.F.A. at Bowling Green State University.

Weimer also joined the faculty here in 1970 as an instructor in music education. A native of Mansfield, Ohio, he won his Bachelor of Music at Ohio State and his M.M. at the University of Illinois.

Chorale To Sing Tuesday Night

The Division of Art, Music, and Theatre will present the St. Andrews Chorale in a concert of sacred music at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, May 9, in the First United Methodist Church of Laurinburg.

The Chorale, under the direction of Edwin Barlow, is composed of thirty-six members, thirty of whom are freshmen. Originally organized as a "training choir", the Chorale has grown into an exciting performing group. In December it performed J.S. Bach's "Magnificat in D" in a program of Christmas music.

The program for Tuesday's concert is to include Mozart's "Regina Coeli" and Faure's "Requiem", as well as works by Palestrina, Farrant, Verdi, Tschesnokoff, Thompson, and Eugene Butler.
