Knights Secure 3rd In District

St. Andrews rang up its tenth soccer win of the season Tuesday with a 3-1 victory at Pembroke State University. The win in a physically bruising game virtually clinched a third-place finish in NAIA District 29 regular season play and assured the Knights a spot in the District tournament opening November 14.

Prem Thoopakabalin scored all three goals for Coach Rob Kinne's Knights, the second time this season he has scored "the hat trick". With two of St. Andrews' top four scorers missing the game because of injuries, Prem's performance was a timely one.

The sophomore from Bangkok, Thailand got his first goal 13 minutes into the first half when the Knights were awarded a penalty kick. The Braves evened the score up with eight minutes left in the half. Yeager lofted a kick from 18 yards out that was literally in the top right corner just beyond Goalie John Bush's finger tips. An inch or two higher or wider and the shot would have hit the goal post or top bar.

Just as a half-time tie was looming Senior Broad Hale managed to partially clear the ball from a scramble that developed when a Pembroke goalie had stopped a shot but dropped the ball. Thoopakabalin spotted the loose ball and tapped it into the Braves goal with 3:45 left in the half.

St. Andrews held its 2-1 lead through 30 minutes of the second half until Thoopakabalin got the final goal of the hotly-contested game. Thoopakabalin started goalward with the ball but when the Braves defense converged on him, passed to Rick Judge. Judge drew the defense out, then passed back to Thoopakabalin who then booted it home for the final 3-1 margin.

Early in the second half St. Andrews lost Freshman Dave Miller in a pike-up in the Pembroke goal. What at first appeared to be a broken leg for the versatile first-year man who learned the game in Africa, proved to be only a painful injury. Whether he can be ready for Friday's game at East Carolina is not yet known. Forwards Don Cooper and John Catmur and Fullback John LaGuardia, all of whom missed the Pembroke game, are to see an orthopedic specialist this week to determine when they can return to action.

sentatives on the Senate died for lack of a second.

Lynchburg Clinches DIAC Title With 2-1 Victory Over Knights

Lynchburg College booted home two goals in the first half, then withstood a game St. Andrews come-back try in the second half for a 2-1 soccer victory here Saturday afternoon. The win gave the Virginians the Dixie Conference soccer championship and left them undefeated in the larger District 29 competition with a 7-0 record.

The loss dropped the knights to a third place tie with Pembroke State, both with 4-2 district records, behind Campbell at 5-1. In the District championship play-off in mid-November first and fourth-place teams and second and third-

place teams will meet in the opening round.

Saturday both the Knights and Lynnets opened at full throttle and maintained a fast pace of play throughout most of the warm afternoon. After 15 minutes of fairly even play Lynchburg's Carl Cooper slipped through the St. Andrews defense and in center-front of the goal took a pass from Bob Coote and drove the ball into the left side of the nets for a 1-0 lead.

After another 12 minutes of see-saw play with only an occasional deep penetration by either team, Lynchburg struck again with stunning quickness.

A pass intended for a Knight defender went astray, Coote took possession and passed quickly to Bangerter. The speedy forward then eluded at a single Knight defense man and again from front and center beat Knight Goalie John Bush with a driving kick and Lynchburg had a 2-0 lead with 17 minutes left in the half.

Twelve minutes into the second half the Knights got new life on a goal by John Catmur. With three Lynchburg defenders falling to clear a ball quickly, Richard Rhoderick booted it to "The Cat" who knifed through the defense and beat Goalie John Bethard. Minutes later the Knights' rekindled hopes were dampened when Catmur went down in a pile-up, re-injured his knee and was lost for the rest of the game.

In the final 30 minutes each team threatened several times.
