Both of these award winning works will become part of the permanent collection of the Fayetteville Art Show, which will open December 6, at the Fayetteville Museum and run through the end of the month.

The 14th annual Springs Traveling Art Show, which is sponsored by Springs Mill Inc., was, and is one of the most interesting shows to come to St. Andrews. Last year the exhibit, consisting of 33 art works, selected from a field of 757 entries, opened in October, in Lancaster, South Carolina. This show is open to all artists of the two Carolinas. St. Andrews is the fourteenth of fifteen scheduled stops which the show makes while touring other colleges and institutions around the Carolinas. This show consists of varied entries, featuring paintings in many media, sculpture, drawing, water color and collage.
