

Off Campus Registration Tuesday

Registration for off campus Winter Term courses will take place this coming Tuesday, says College Registrar Dr. James Stephens.

Actual registration will take place in the office of the Registrar on Tuesday from 9:00 a.m. to 12 noon, and from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. All students intending to take on off campus course are required to consult informally with their faculty advisors before Tuesday an and to pick up their registration packet in Tuesday. Upon receiving the packet they must pay at the cashier's Office whatever deposit is required for the course, and return to the Registrar's Office with verification of payment in order for the registration process to be completed. Decisions as to whether or not a proposed Winter Term course is actually scheduled will depend upon the number of persons who enroll.

Registration for on-campus courses will not be held until October 21, to take advantage of the number of people in courses which were cancelled due to insufficient registration.

College President A. P. Perkinson has announced to the faculty the formation of a committee to search for a Dean of the College to replace Victor Arnold, who resigned in May.

In a memo to the faculty on September 27, Perkinson said that in accordance with the guidelines established by the faculty in a May meeting, the committee will consist of chairmen of the three academic divisions of the College, three students, to be appointed by Student

Association President Paul Baldasare, and three additional faculty members to be elected by the faculty at large.

Nominations for the faculty positions will be taken at the faculty meeting of October 13. Dr. Donald Barnes, chairman of the Division of Health, Natural and Mathematical Sciences will serve as chairman of the committee

Currently the post is held by Dr. Ronald Crossley, a professor of Religion at St. Andrews.

Swine Flu Registration To Begin

Scotland County's participation in the nationwide swine influenza vaccination program is scheduled to begin soon after October 4, County Health Department officials have told THE LANCE. Currently the department is holding a preregistration for those who wish to receive the vaccine. Although not among the highest risk age group (60 to 65), St. Andrews students are also encouraged to be vaccinated by department officials.

The vaccine offer protection against swine influenza, a strain of flu that caused a worldwide influenza pandemic in 1918. Early this year several hundred recruits at the Fort Dix, New Jersey ar-

my outpost contracted the flu, which led the federal government to consider the threat of a widespread outbreak serious enough to call for a nationwide innoculation program.

Before preregistering at the Health Department, which is located on Main Street next to McDonald's, citizens must receive information concerning the vaccine and its possible side effects, and sign a small registration form. Those under 18 must present evidence of parental permission. More information can be obtained by visiting the Department between 8:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, or by calling 276-1411.
