

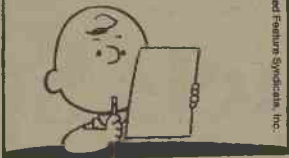

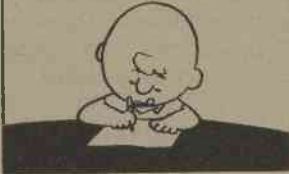
To the Editor,

The New Male, by Herb Goldberg.

The author examines the crises created by traditional notions of masculinity and concludes that men today are in a Catch-22 position; programmed to be tough and independent, they are now supposed to help out at home and to be sensitive partners to their changing women.

Unforgettable Fire; Pictures Drawn by Atomic Bomb Survivors, edited by Japan Broadcasting Corporation.

Approximately 240,000 people in Hiroshima were casualties of the "unforget-

table fire" of the atomic bomb dropped on the city in 1945. The survivors, who have the memory etched in their minds, have recreated their impressions in vivid color drawings accompanied by brief descriptions. 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Committee since 1969, and has served as chairperson of that committee since 1975. She has held membership in the Southeast Regional Executive Committee of AFSC for two years, and is clerk of the St. Petersburg Religious Society of Friends. Also, she is founder and organizer of "Circus McGirkus," a "people's fair" held in St. Petersburg since 1972.

On Sunday night at 7:30 p.m. in Belk Main Lounge, she will address the topic "U.S.-U.S.S.R.: Where We are and Where We're Headed." A slide show and discussion will highlight the speech.

Mr. William Reynolds will accompany Ms. McCloskey

on the St. Andrews visit. McCloskey explains: He's more fact oriented and I'm more people oriented."

Reynolds' credentials are impressive. His work is based with AFSC in Atlanta, Georgia. While director of the national AFSC Disarmament program, he served as a delegate and member of the U.S. Steering Committee at the World Forum on Disarmament, Peace, and Detente at Helsinki, Finland in 1981.

He has developed and taught adult educational courses on U.S.-Soviet Relations and the Strategic Arms Race. Under President Carter, Reynolds was consul-

tant to the Presidential Advisory Group on Radioactive Waste Management.

He will speak on Monday night, March 1 at 7:30 p.m. on "Sanity and the Superpowers--Another View of the Nuclear Arms Race and the Soviet Threat." His speech will be held in Belk Main Lounge.

Both speakers will conduct a workshop on "Nuclear Issues and Questions" from 3-5 p.m. on Monday afternoon in Belk Center. The Americans for Democratic Action and the College Christian Union will sponsor the guests who say they are "enthusiastic about visiting Laurinburg."
