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
action that can really bring about positive effects. This is especially so at St. Andrews because of its small size.

During the summer a faculty designed Psychology Laboratory Facility was built in the lower floor of the Morgan-Jones Science Building.

This 3000-square-foot complex has greatly increased the opportunities for both and student faculty psychology research at St. Andrews. The flexible design of the lab will allow students to carry out independent projects as well as working with the Psychology Faculty on research.

The lab has six observation rooms fitted with one-way observation windows. These present a much more natural setting for observations, such as the social interactions of playing children.
