Members of Religion 213, "Social Issues in Ethical and Religious Perspective" opened the spring session with the controversial subject of homosexuality. An idea taken from a required text, Scanzoni and Mollenkott's IS THE HOMOSEXUAL MY NEIGHBOR?, was used to determine the degree of homophobia on the campus of St. Andrews. The "if you are gay, WEAR BLUE JEANS TODAY" campaign was first introduced at the University of Illinois. Large numbers of students had given up their regular attire of jeans to avoid being labeled as homosexual. Would this be the case with St. Andrews' students? the class was determined to find out.

This experiment was not to determine the number of gay individuals on campus but to measure the degree of campus homophobia. In addition to this, it also wanted to show the damage that can be done when sexuality is based upon evidence that is merely superficial.
