St. Andrews Defeats UNC-G

After an action-packed hour and fifteen minutes, the Lady Knights volleyball team rumbled past UNC-G to claim the number one position in the Dixie Conference.

"The whole team did exceptionally well," beamed coach Jo Ann Williams. "They were aggressive and took the game to the other team. Our hitting was right on and we returned the ball with incredible accuracy."


The match against UNC-G was one that was long anticipated. The women's team was second in the conference because of a loss to them early in the season, and that same loss also denied them a position in the national standings, in which UNC-G was sixteenth.

"Because of tonight's victory, we are now number one in the conference and we may well

be in the national standings now," explained Coach Williams.

The match began with the Knights winning games one and two 15-9 and 15-8 with what looked like relative ease. The crowd began to relax and enjoy the match until the third game when the women fell to UNC-G 12-15. The intensity level was high in the fourth game, St. Andrews fighting for a victory and Greensboro fighting for a tie which would bring on game number five. After ten minutes of scoreless volley, Lisa Stafford spiked the ball for the first point of the game and there began the end for UNC-G.

"The women played to their full potential tonight. The other side never had a chance after that first point. They looked like this was game number one, not game four--they were that revved up," one spectator commented.

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Consul General Opens German Week

A speech from the Consul General of the Federal Republic of Germany, Alexander von Schmeling will kick off German Week here on Sunday.

Von Schmeling has held various appointments in West Germany's foreign service over the last 30 years. Von Schmeling, a lawyer-statesperson who attended the Universities of Kiel and Bonn in West Germany, has served in Belgium, India, Malaysia, Portugal, Italy and in the Embassy in Washington, D.C., and now Atlanta.

His speech, at 8 p.m. in Avinger Auditorium, begins the week of events designed to promote international relations by presenting the many facets of German life to St. Andrews students and residents of Southeastern

North Carolina. A mini-Oktoberfest concludes the week on the following Saturday, Oct. 24. "St. Andrews has always had a commitment to international awareness," said German Week co-chair Margaret "Pinny" Geffert. "This fall our focus is upon Germany and the close ties this nation and this state have with that country."

Mrs. Geffert and her husband Carl, a professor of German at St. Andrews, organized the events of the week to show every facet of life in Germany. Beginning with Von Schmeling's talk, St. Andrews should be alive with "gemeutlichkeit"; roughly translated to mean "congeniality."
