## Riders Perform in IHSA Competition

St. Andrews riders fared well in the first two Intercollegiate Horse Show Association competitions of the fall. In this type of show, the riders are judged on their equitation, or body position, and their ability to obtain the best possible performance from the horse. They ride the animals provided by the college sponsoring the show, drawing lots for the unfamiliar horses, and have virtually no warm-up or preparation time before entering the ring to be judged. Riders compete in "flat" classes, riding at the walk, trot, and canter, and in "over fences" classes, having the horse jump around a course of fences. There are several divisions in which to ride, from beginner to advanced level, into which the individual is placed according to ability.
