Vietnam Winter Term Trip

Professor Tom Williams of the history department is sponsoring a winter term trip to the Democratic Republic of Vietnam. This trip will permit students to visit and study many of the sites of the American involvement in Vietnam, including: Hanoi, Hue, Danang, and Saigon (Ho Chi Minh City). Students will study the American involvement in Vietnam while traveling through the country from north to south. The course will include discussions with Vietnamese college students in Hanoi, Hue, and Saigon. These sessions will be arranged by the Vietnamese government.

This is one of the few college trips that the Vietnamese government has authorized since the end of the American phase of the war in Indochina. It will provide St. Andrews students with the unique opportunity to experience another culture and retrace the American past. The St. Andrews party is limited to a total of ten members. Special consideration will be given to those students who have a background in East Asian or modern American studies and who have travel experience.


