

14 Named Who's Who at St. Andrews

The 1994 edition of *Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges* will include the names of 14 students from St. Andrews College who have been selected as national outstanding leaders.

Students are selected for *Who's Who* based on their academic achievement, service to the community, leadership in extracurricular activities and potential for continued success. They are selected from more than 1,400 institutions of higher learning in all 50 states, the District of Columbia and several foreign nations.

Outstanding students have been honored in the annual directory since it was first published in 1934. Students named this year from St. Andrews College:

Daniel Albert is a senior cultural studies and mathematics major. He is the son of Greg Albert and Evelyn Reed-Victor of Savanna, Ill. and a graduate of the Open High School. Albert is president of the Christian Service Organization. He is studying in Beijing, China during the spring 1994 semester.

Machelle A. Allman is a senior modern languages (Spanish and German) major with a business and economics minor. She is the daughter of Dr. James D. and Karen H. Allman of Del Rio, Tex. and a graduate of Brindisi American High School in Italy. She is a member of Alpha Chi, the St. Andrews Honor Society and the General Honors Program. She was selected to the Academic All-Conference team in volleyball.

She studied in Ecuador through the college's semester exchange program with the University of Cuenca in spring 1993.

Wendy H. Dean is a senior biology and chemistry major. She is the daughter of Jane H. and Norman G. Dean III of Aberdeen, N.C. and a graduate of Pinecrest High School. She is a member of Tri-Beta, the St. Andrews Honor Society, president of CHAOS and commuter representative to the Student Activities Union.

Brian C. Doles is junior history and politics major with a minor in philosophy. He is the son of Marie and William Doles of Tifton, Ga. and a graduate of Tift County High School. He is president of the Student Government Association at St. Andrews, and belongs to the History Club, Philosophy Symposium and General Honors Program.

Traci D. Fayet is a senior biology and pre-med major with a minor in psychology. She is the daughter of Cliff and Betty Fayet of Macon, Ga. and a graduate of Windsor Academy. She belongs to Alpha Chi and the St. Andrews Honor Society, and received the Dames Scholarship. She spent her junior year studying at Stirling University in Scotland.

Rolf P. Jeppson is a senior political science major with minors in history and in business and economics. He is president of the Pre-law Club, in Alpha Chi and co-chair of a committee evaluating the accessibility of the Laurinburg business community for disabled persons.

Michael D. Lessig is a senior mathematics major with a minor in physics. He is the son of Raymond and Eva Lessig of Kennett Square, Pa. He is president of his residence hall, a member of the Student Government Association and in the Math and Computer Science Club.

Shad K. Luedke is a senior business and economics major with a computer information systems minor. He is the son of George Luedke, Jr. of Longview, Wash. and Ilona Ivanoff of Kalama, Wash. He was 1992-93 president of his residence hall and representative to the Student Government Association. He belongs to Alpha Chi, Omicron Delta Epsilon and the St. Andrews Honor Society. Among awards Luedke has received are the National Collegiate Business Merit Award and the Wall Street Journal Award.

Thomas H. Peacock is a senior English major. He is the son of Dr. E.H. and Jennifer M. Peacock of Columbia, S.C. and a graduate of the Blue Ridge School. He has served as director of the Writers' Forum and is chairing the senior class Campaign for St. Andrews. He spent winter term 1994 studying in Geneva, Switzerland.

Ian Pena is a senior physical education major. He is the son of James and Phillipa Pena of St. Joseph Republic of Trinidad and Tobago. He was captain of St. Andrews' men's soccer team and made the All Conference and All District teams in 1990 and 1993.

Michael B. Randolph is a senior psychology major. He is the son of the Rev. and Mrs. Julius William and Jeran Randolph, Jr. of Bolivia, N.C. and a graduate of South Brunswick High School. He belongs to the Psychology Club and the Black Student Union.

Shannon D. Rivers is a senior elementary education major. She is the daughter of Gordon and Patricia Rivers of Asheboro, N.C. She is a member of the women's varsity basketball team, played volleyball and softball, and was instrumental in the formation of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes at St. Andrews. She received the Joann Williams Scholarship.

S. A. Announce Heritage Grant

St. Andrews Presbyterian College announces a special grant program for students in a seven-county area surrounding the college. High school students (and students holding a two-year degree) who live in Cumberland, Hoke, Marlboro (S.C.), Moore, Richmond, Robeson and Scotland counties will automatically be awarded the Founder's Heritage Grant when they apply to St. Andrews.

The Heritage Grant is worth \$4,000 per student per year and is designed to make the cost of attending the area's only Presbyterian affiliated liberal arts college more immediately affordable for full-time students.

"As the college moves into the next century, we wish to establish stronger bonds with our community," said President Thomas L. Reuschling. "It was the desire of people in these local counties that a new college be founded in this area

to serve the educational, cultural and leadership needs of the region. The Founder's Heritage Grant is a response by St. Andrews to the sons and daughters of the families who helped build the College. We feel that we are uniquely situated to provide a private, ethically-centered education to the deserving students of the region."

St. Andrews first opened for classes in 1961, although plans for a new college that combined the strengths of Flora Macdonald College in Red Springs and Presbyterian Junior College in Maxton had been in the works for years. The Founder's Heritage Grant is one way the college is looking to reestablish its alliances with the local communities, in service to those students and their parents faced with tough choices about their higher education.

"As I leave the presidency at St. Andrews," said Reuschling, "it is gratifying to establish a program that

will leave a lasting contribution to St. Andrews and the community it serves. The Founder's Heritage Grant will increase St. Andrews' involvement in the life and future of the community."

The Founder's Heritage Grant will be incorporated with the student's other financial assistance to provide additional support toward the cost of attending the private college, and to make St. Andrews a more attractive option to both college-bound students and students holding their two-year degree who wish to continue their education.
