Dixon worries that the campus police have gotten a bad reputation and would like to remind the students that he and the rest of his team are on their side. "It's a matter of diffusing misconceptions," Dixon states.

Dixon hopes that the students aren't worried when they see him walking around their

dorms. "Police presence in the dorms is intrusive," he says, "but I don't know any better way to meet the students."

He feels that enforcing the rules is really only half of his job and that if he gains the students' trust, everyone's life will be easier. But that doesn't mean he's going to be easier on everyone. "Sometimes RA's are reluctant to enforce dorm rules, and we want them to know they have our support," Dixon says.

Overall, Dixon is not worried about the students of St. Andrews. He calls the SAPC campus "relatively mild." "Most St. Andrews students are very respectful," Dixon says.
