September 9 saw the showdown between the Knights and Pfeiffer. There was immediate pressure by the Knights as Hartman and Roca forced the ball downfield. The resulting corner kick was sent out down field. With tight officiating, the game became a seesaw battle. Roca, Hilton, and Balentine each contributed with defensive strength to try to get things started. Eamma and Marcionette combined on a shot on goal which resulted in a beautiful save by the Pfeiffer keeper.

However, the pressure would not go away, and this time it was a Marcionette pass to Mark Clemente that resulted in a goal.

Unfortunately, this momentum starter did not last long. A misdirected S.A. pass ended up scoring a Pfeiffer goal a mere twenty seconds later. With some strong defensive moves by Fillmore, Hilton and Wagner, the game remained tied at the half. The second half started with almost immediate pressure from Pfeiffer with a Wagner save at 40:35. Jon Hendrickson made a nice steal and used nice footwork to get a pass to Hartman. Hartman came up just short on a oneon-one with the keeper. He then had to show his speed while running down an errant pass and almost saved it. Wagner got his work in goal, making a diving and deflecting save and a couple of more traditional saves before allowing a goal at 21:54. Fillmore, Roca and Marcionette made several strong plays in the effort.
