New Faculty Member

Maxton, North Carolina, Jan. 31, 1950. A new faculty member at Presbyterian Junior College is Mr. Frederick W. Franck who occupies the position made vacant by the illness of Dr. Wharton. Mr. Franck is in charge of all Spanish classes.

A graduate in modern languages at the University of Illinois in 1938, Mr. Franck has had graduate work in Spanish at the University of Illinois and also in the University of Mexico, Mexico City. In various trips he has travelled considerably throughout the Republic of Mexico.

During the war Mr. Franck was a Coast Guard ensign and assigned to Communications, and later was with Navy Japanese Language School at Boulder, Colo.

During 1946 through 1948 he was an instructor of Spanish at the University of Idaho, Moscow, Idaho. From this position he resigned to take over an historical research position for the restoration of Fauquier White Sulphur Springs near Warrenton, Va. This resort, famous in the half-century before the War of the 1860's, was destroyed by a battle there in 1862. Mr. Franck has published a review of this historical work in the January 1950 issue of The Virginia Magazine of History and Biography, published at Richmond, Va.

Mr. Franck has had considerable interest in music, is himself a pianist and will have charge of the student orchestra and a glee club at Presbyterian Junior College.

Piano Lessons

Maxton, North Carolina, Jan. 31, 1950. Music will be taught at Presbyterian Junior College the second semester by Mrs. May Kareis Darling. Each Friday from 2 until 3 o'clock a class in Harmony and Theory will be taught. Practice pianos are available at the college and individual instruction in piano will be given there. Credit will be given by the college to qualified students who register before Feb. 21.

Mrs. Darling has previously taught piano, glee club, harmony and theory, and German at Presbyterian Junior College for two years. She is a graduate of the School of Music of Carnegie Institute of Technology with the Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in piano and music education. She won the first prize, a silver loving cup in 1948, awarded by the Federation of Junior Women's Clubs in North Carolina for choral composition. Her entry was "Behold the Lam of God" for mixed voices. Several of her other choral and instrumental compositions have been performed by religious and civic musical organizations. Mrs. Darling is a member of Sigma Alpha Iota National Professional Music Fraternity.

A new course in music appreciation is now being offered at P. J. C. with Mr. Franck as the instructor. This course, one of several short courses being given the first 18 weeks, is primarily for students at the college but anyone who is interested in doing so may attend without charge.

Its main function is to acquaint the student with works of many masters; these include the classical and semi-classical songs. Many masters of paintings will also be brought out.

Classes began Tuesday night, February 14, and will continue to be held on each Tuesday and Thursday at 7:00 p. m. until 8:00.
