The executive power belongs to the president of the Republic: but it is the responsible ministers whe in reality hold the power.

Tho president of the Ropublic ropresents France. he signs the treaties and presides in the foreign relations, he appoints the ninister he mames the civil and military employees; he disposes of the army force, he establishes the law; he can ilissolve the chamber of deputies on suituble advice from the Senate; he has the right of srace.

These attributions would make of the president of the Republic a powerful nonarchy it he personally exercised thera. But he cammot exercise them without the ministers' help. Each of his acts must be countersigned by a responsible minister

They are the ministers who gorern under the control of Parliament.
