CHARTER DAY

The State Teachers College of Elizabeth City, N. C., celebrated the fifty-second anniversary of the granting of her charter, held impressive Senior Day ceremonies in Moore Auditorium on Wednesday March 3.

At nine in the morning all members of the college body met in Moore Auditorium in convocation. The senior class under its administrative sponsor, the Dean of the College, Mr. Sidney Williams, was presented to Dr. H. L. Trigg, the college president. Dr. Trigg administered the college oath of allegiance to the class, preliminary to inducting the senior class officers and other senior classmates into the administrative and faculty posts which they were to fill for the day. The class officers and the post which they held are as follows: Mr. Frederick Fletcher, Pres., Mr. Clifton Wood, Dean, Miss Emma Rosbury, Registrar, Mr. Robert Newkirk, Budget Officer, and Mrs. Margaret E. Brown, Bursar.

Following the induction, the first year class was administered the freshman oath by Mr. Fletcher. The end of the ceremony is marked by the advancement of classes. Seniors move to seats usually reserved for guests to indicate their readiness to go out into the world; juniors have in-

to the seats vacated by the seniors, sophomores into those vacated by juniors, and freshmen into those vacated by sophomores. The advancement of the freshmen held a particular significance for them, for it is only after this seating ceremony that freshmen are formally admitted into all the rights and privileges of the general student body.

All the activities of the college were taken over by the seniors for a school day of six hours. Seniors not only ran the administrative post, they ran the health service, the recreation program, the dining room, the after assembly, and all the classroom routines. Since Charter Day this year fell in the trimester exam period, seniors proctored all the examinations for the day. A visitor to the campus probably would not have noted any difference in the conduct of the institution, so well did the seniors fulfill their responsibilities.

At six-thirty in the evening the college had as its honored guest at supper Mr. P.B. Young, distinguished editor of the Norfolk Journal and Guide. The day was climaxed by Mr. Young's address to the college body in Moore Auditorium at 7:30, and the crowning of the senior queen, Mrs. Dorothy Councill, chosen by her classmates as the senior best representing the ideals of attainment in scholarship, character, and achievement.
