

**ECSU BECOMES TESTING CENTER**

Elizabeth City State University has been appointed as an institutional examiner for the College Entrance Examination Board Institutional Admissions Testing Program (IATP) for the year July 1, 1969, through June 30, 1970.

Scheduled to give its first examination under this program between June 15 - 30, Elizabeth City State University will have full responsibility for administering the test, securing test materials, and reporting results and operations to Educational Testing Service.

Dr. Ernest A. Finney, Director of Student Teaching and the Summer School, will serve as the Director of the IATP Program at Elizabeth City State University. The type of test to be administered under this program is the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), the score of which is a requirement for admission to any college. Dr. Finney requested that guid-

ance counselors, principals, superintendents, and students in the area take full and continued advantage of this testing service.

**SPELLER TO ATTEND USOE INSTITUTE**

Benjamin F. Speller, Jr., Instructor of Library Service and Catalogue in the G. R. Little Library at Elizabeth City State University has been selected to participate in the USOE Institute at Case Western Reserved University, Cleveland, Ohio. The institute, "Implications of the New Technology for Teaching Library Science," will be held from July 28 - August 8.

According to the communique from Miss Lavahn Overmyer, Director of the Center of Documentation and Communication Research at the university, Speller will receive a stipend for attending the institute. Recently selected to direct the Self-Study Program at Elizabeth City State University, he is a native of Windsor, N. C., and holds degrees from North Carolina College and Indiana University.

**1970 World Wide Tour**

Dr. Marion D. Thorpe, President, and Dr. Ernest A. Finney, Director of Student Teaching and Summer School at Elizabeth City State University were selected by the Comparative Education Society to participate in the 1970 world-wide educational tour. The Society, which sponsors seminars and field studies for educators to all parts of the world, is working closely with UNESCO's declaration of 1970 as International Education Year.

Under the broad theme: "Educational Contracts Around The World, Drs. Thorpe and Finney are invited to join other educators and administrators from colleges in the United States on the tour. Designed to further encourage comparative and international studies in education, the March 3-April 2, 1970 tour will include visits to Switzerland, Russia, Turkey, Lebanon, Thailand, Hong Kong, and Japan.

Dr. Thorpe recently was officially installed as President of Elizabeth City State University, becoming one of the youngest presidents of a four-year college. He has a wide range of administrative and educational experiences. Currently he is also a member of HEW's National Advisory Committee on Dyslexia and Related Reading Disorders, and the ad hoc Selecting Committee of the Woodrow Wilson Foundation's Martin Luther King Fellowship.

Dr. Finney, who studies the relationship of economics to education during last summer's Foundation for Economics Education, Inc. Seminar, is listed in Who's Who In American Education and Who's Who In College Administration.

**John Williams Speaker At Banquet**

The Rev. John T. Williams delivered the keynote address, during the American Legion's Linton J. Sutton Post sports banquet.

The banquet was given in honor of pro-signees Johnny B. Walton and Earl Bryant as a local token of appreciation for their excellent performance in collegiate football. Walton, former ball slinging quarterback at Elizabeth City State University and Bryant, the former aggressive defensive halfback at Norfolk State College, have signed pro contracts and will be departing soon for training.

Williams, known in this area parting soon for training. Walton is bound for Los Angeles as the first Negro to sign an NFL contract as a quarterback, as the heavy voice of the Lions, began writing sports 19 years ago while a student at P.W. Moore. He covered the game for the Virginia Union University Panthers from 1955-1957, and intermittently for Elizabeth City State University from 1958-1968. A Legionnaire, the speaker is well familiar with the exploits of Walton and Bryant. Williams is currently director of Public Information at Elizabeth City State University.

According to Harry Felton chairman of the banquet committee, representatives from Norfolk State College and Elizabeth City State University were invited to attend the banquet.

Bryant is heading for Kansas City of the AFL. Both played high school football at Elizabeth City's P. W. Moore High School for former Coach Walter Hunter's Lions. They were collegiate rivals in the CIAA.
