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Forum Committee Report

'BIRTH CONTROL, HOW?'

Birth control is a very controversial subject. There have been many arguments for and against the use of the pill. The question always seems to be whether it is medically or morally safe. Because the subject of birth control is continually being discussed, Mr. Larry Martin, Advisor of the Forum Committee invited a panel to give their reaction to a film entitled "Birth Control, How?"

The panel was made up of people from all walks of life so as to give the audience a variety of views on the subject. The panel members were all vibrant speakers. Father Anderson, a Catholic Priest who is an instructor of theology at St. Michael's College in Vermont was one of the speakers. He is serving in the absence of Father Robinson at St. Catherine's Church for this summer. We were glad to have Miss Yvonne Jenkins, a visiting summer school student here at ECSU who is a senior at Michigan State University majoring in chemical genetics. On the panel along with Father Anderson and Miss Jenkins were Dr. James Jones, a gynecologist who practices here

in Elizabeth City; Mr. William Morris, a senior here at ECSU from Hartford, Connecticut, majoring in sociology; Mr. Frentes Morris, employed by the Economic Improvement Council and Director of the community organization for the ten Albemarle counties; and Mrs. Janice Hones, a local resident, employed as a sixth grade teacher at H. L. Trigg Elementary School wife and mother of two.

Each member of the panel gave a brief summary of the film and gave their opinion concerning birth control.

Dr. Jones said, poor people have a lot of children mainly because they were lazy. Dr. Jones was challenged by many students. One student disagreed with him and asked the question, "What about the people who live in isolated areas and who can't get to the proper medical facilities, and those who don't have the finance, and those who are illiterate?" He responded to these questions by saying, first of all he could only speak for the Negroes and they, he said, managed to buy televisions and other such things. One person in the

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ECSU GETS NEW DEAN

President Marion D. Thorpe announced to the Advisory Council that Dr. Floyd B. Holley will fill the position of Dean at Elizabeth City State University, effective as of August 1, 1969. Thomas E. Carter, Assistant Professor of Mathematics, who has done a very commendable job as Acting Dean at ECSU since the death of Dr. William Anderson, in June, 1967, will assist Dr. Holley in his new position.

In making the official announcement, Dr. Thorpe gave a brief resume of the new dean, who is well known in eastern North Carolina. Dr. Holley, a native of Hertford, N.C., has served in this area as: county supervisor in the WPA adult education program, Hertford, N.C.; Camp Educational Adviser, Civilian Conservation Corps, Jacksonville, N.C.; Dean of Boys and Social Studies Teacher, Hertford High School; and as Assistant Principal at formerly Williamston (N.C.) High School.

Following his graduation from Shaw University in 1937, Dr. Holley's experiences in Perquimans County provided valuable information for his Thesis: "The Perquimans County Civic Forum." He received the Master of Science degree in Sociology from Columbia University, in 1947.

Dr. Holley, who is presently a School Psychiatric Social Worker in the Bureau of Child Guidance, in New York, will bring to ECSU a wealth of knowledge and experience in social work, psychiatry, education, and administration. He received the Ed. D degree in Sociology from New York University in 1964.

Married to the former Miss Margaret Hardison of Sneads Ferry, an alumna of ECSU, Dr. Holley has written several publications and has lectured extensively at Atlanta University, New York University, and the University of the City of New York.

Honored by NYU in 1965 for his outstanding services in social work and psychotherapy, Dr. Holley holds membership in the National Association of Social Workers; the Academy of Certified Social Workers, the American Sociological Association, and numerous other professional, educational, and fraternal organizations and associations.
