The Art Department at City Elizabeth State University this year has forty-eight majors. Books catalogued with the Dewey Decimal number 100-400 have been moved from the second floor of the library to the first floor.

The periodical indexes and reference collection has been relocated from the first floor which will enable students to to the second floor.

Also complete reference service is now available on the second floor of the library from 8:00 A. M. until 10:00 P. M.
