The Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) and Achievement Tests - November 5, 1977, December 3, 1977, May 6, 1978, and June 3, 1978

The Graduate Management Admissions Test (GMAT) -November 5, 1977

The Graduate Record Examination (GRE, which contains a section designed to measure analytical ability) -December 10, 1977

The Law School Admission Test (LSAT) - October 8, 1977 The National Teacher Examination (NTE, on which North Carolina requires a composite score of 950 for certification) - November 12, 1977, February 18, 1978, and July 15, 1978

The Miller Analogies Test (MAT) and the College Level Placement Tests (CLEP) are arranged on an individual basis, with the CLEP Tests being administered during the third week of each month
