University's Business Department will resume participation in the Black Executive Exchange Program (BEEP), from February through May 5. According to Dr. John H. Carson, Chairman of the Business Department, ten banking executives, loan officers and loans specialists will lecture during the course in Money and Banking currently taught by Dr. Saeeb Nizami.

ECSU first participated in BEEP in 1975 when two lectures were presented.
