Mark Lane Speaks at ECSU

off-campus threats of disruption, controversial attorney Mark Lane spoke Thursday night in Moore Hall on the ECSU campus. His two-hour wspeech was a defense of his client James Earl Ray who has been convicted of the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Under tight security after testified before a King after confessing to the Congressional committee last summer that was investigating the assassination of President Kennedy and Dr. King. As Ray's lawyer, Lane is demanding a new trial based on what he calls new evidence that Ray was innocent of the murder and that the assassination was a conspiracy by the FBI.

Ray was sentenced to 99 years for the murder of Dr. crime. But Ray now claims that he did not confess of his own free will. He further asserts that he was "used by the FBI, moved around the country, paid substantial sums of money and directed to but a rifle and report to Memphis on April 4, 1968."

According to Lane, a witness who saw the real assassin has now been

located and is ready to testify assassination. His book, Rush were there a new trial.

Lane also is outspoken about the Kennedy

to Judgement, attacks the government's handling of the Kennedy investigation.
