Activists such as slave-born Sojourner Truth, Elizabeth Stanton,

women could not have a voice in our land. They lectured and petitioned the government for the emancipation of slaves with the belief that, once the war was over, women and slaves alike would be granted the same rights as the white men. With the sidestepping of women's rights, women activists became enraged, and Stanton and her colleagues established the American Equal Rights Association in 1866 in effort to organize in the fight for women's rights. They worked for many years to get us where we are today. Since 1777, women of time have worked for our equal justice in America. We still continue to press forward. In 1997, Madeleine K. Albright became the first woman U.S. Secretary of State.
