
Coach Gaines In Hall Of Fame

Coach Gaines has been at Winston-Salem State College since ston-Salem State College since 1945, serving in all capacities of the physical education depart-ment. Under his leadership in basketball over the years, his teams have won 427 and lost only 153 games. In addition he has guided the Rams to six CIAA tournament championships, four regular season titles, Chicago Invitational Championship, two Georgia Invitational Titles, and four NAIA district tournaments. As you can tell from the records, Coach Gaines is long over due for this honor.
