
It was reported at the meeting that a visiting team from the Department of Public Instruction conducted its evaluation of the Winston-Salem State University (WSSU) Teacher Education Program. Their report indicated that the program received an overall rating of two; which is described as adequately met.

In further academic reports, WSSU's faculty committees are now developing the sequence of courses for authorized degree programs in Accounting, Economics and Recreation Education. The deadline for completion of these program plans is December 17, 1979. Also, the Computor Science program has been revised and majors will be required to complete only 24 semester hours of Computer Science courses to qualify for the Bachelor of Science degree.

To meet the demands of the new students in this field and others, efforts are being made to establish a student advisement system, which will permit more student contact with assigned academic advisors.

Deborah L. Waddell, a student at Winston-Salem State University and Ms. Barbara Crumwell, Placement Director were among representatives of 33 colleges and universities who convened in Atlanta, November 13-16, as guests of the Peace Corps.

Concerned that only 4.9 percent of the volunteers who go abroad with the Peace Corps come from minority Director William G. Sykes and continues in a non-paid invited the students and supervisors to Atlanta as part of an initiative to increase involvement of minority mem-
