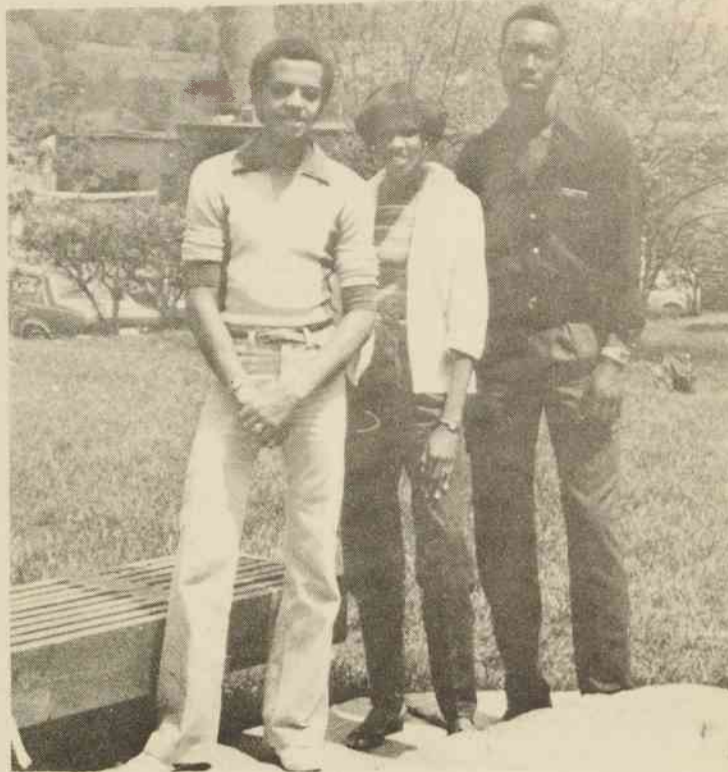

Coed Will Win Business Award

A Winston-Salem State University business education student has won the National Business Education Association Award of Merit for Outstanding Achievement in Business Education.

Josephine Vanessa Jiles of 320 Forest Hill Avenue in Winston-Salem will receive the honor at the annual WSSU Awards Day Program to be held May 7, 1980, at 10 a.m. in the Kenneth R. Williams Auditorium.

The award consists of an attractive certificate, a year's professional membership in the National Business Education Association, a one-year subscription to "Business Education Forum" (a national

professional magazine for business teachers) and the National Business Education Yearbook.

tion, and Community Services Administration. Because of her contributions as a member of such organizations as the House of Foreign Affairs Subcommittee on Africa and the subcommittee on Inter-American Affairs, she has earned the reputation of a member who "does her homework." The Congresswoman also serves as the chairwoman of the Select Committee on Narcotics Abuse Control, and Task Force on Women.

In 1975, this distinguished politician became the first woman and the first black to

ever hold the position of Whip-at-Large within the leadership structure of the U.S. House of Representatives. In 1979, she was elected Chairwoman of the 96th Congress. She has served the Congressional Black

Caucus as secretary and treasurer during the 94th and 95th Congress, respectively.

Because of her extensive list of accomplishments, Congresswoman Collins is listed in *Who's Who*, *Who's Who Among Black Americans*, *Who's Who in the Midwest*,

Who's Who in Black America, *Who's Who Among Women*, and *Who's Who in Government*.

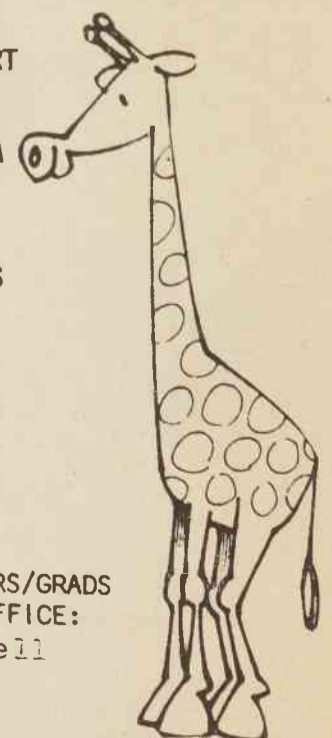
