



Dr. Sonia Sanchez, Poet, Writer Scholar and Political Activist Speaks at WSSU

Dr. Sonia Sanchez, Professor of English at Temple University was guest speaker at a Joseph N. Patterson Lecture and Assembly Series held on February 20, 1986. Dr. Sanchez is the author of 12 books which includes "Homecoming," "We A Badd-DDD People," "Love Poems and Other Stories." Her most recent book is "Homegirls and Handgrenades" which won the 1985 American Book Award. She is also a poet, political activist, playwrite, editor At the Patterson Lecture Series that evening, Dr. Sanchez spoke on the topic of "The Feminine Aspects of Bigger Thomas," and a epistolary she had written for Dr. Martin Luther King. While discussing her topic she also brought out points about "Native Son" written by Richard Wright.

While at WSSU, Dr. Sanchez was able to share her experience and read some of her poetry during a session open to students and the community. After this session she participated in a workshop with Dr. John Holman's creative writing class.

During the workshop Sanchez discussed the types of poems like the haku, the villanelle, prose, free verse, etc. Sanchez emphasized certain techniques and steps students should follow before submitting poetry. She clearly stated that a poem should be written and rewritten numerous times before it is finalized. Sanchez also took time to critique the poem "A Cultural Beating" by Carter Cue.
