
Microelectronics

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MCNC's Communications System is a data and two-way color video network that links North Carolina universities. The data network currently connects more than 1,100 computers at these institutions to support research collaboration, while MCNC's video network allows universities to share resources through teleclasses, seminars and teleconferences. The network broadcasts graduate courses in microelectronics as well as evening courses in a variety of subject, including engineering, nursing, library science and health.

The extension of the MCNC Communications System to Winston-Salem is funded by the General Assembly and supported by the University of North Carolina General Administration.

MCNC is a public-private partnership that combines the resources of Duke University, North Carolina A&T State University, North Carolina State University, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, University of North Carolina at Charlotte and the **Research Triangle Institute.**
