Several seniors are doing their student teaching this semester. It means waking up early in the morning and staying up late at night preparing a lesson plan for the next day's activities.



Patrice Fletcher is also a senior doing her student teaching. Her area of concentration is Business Education. Her future plans include obtaining a teaching job in Atlanta.


