careful eye to make sure that all of the Rams' statistics are documented.

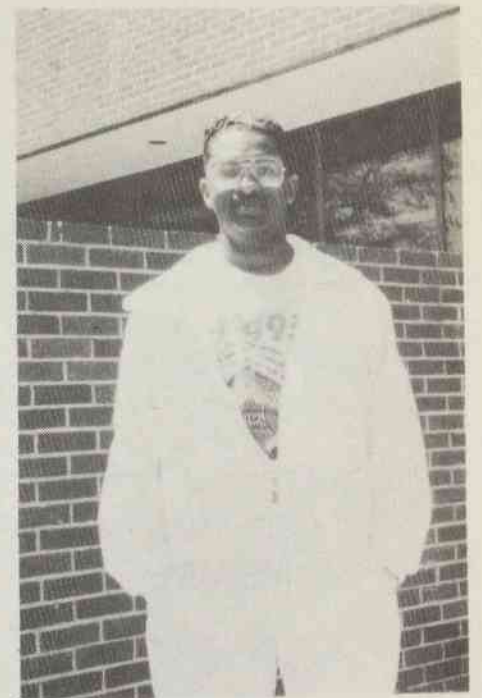
