Snowden Wins

Winston-Salem State University Head Men's Basketball Coach Thomas Snowden, a native of Lexington, has been chosen as recipient of a 1994 Roots and Heritage Award in Lexington, Kentucky.

The Roots and Heritage Festival is "A Celebration of Culture and Achievement" for local individuals who have been instrumental in involving the city's African American community in the local churches. The event is sponsored by the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government and corporate sponsors throughout the Lexington area. New Residence Hall To Be Dedicated Friday

The Winston-Salem State University Board of Trustees last month approved naming the new campus residence hall for Haywood L. Wilson Jr., the long-time vice chancellor for student affairs who died two years ago.

The trustees also named two conference rooms in the new building for Louise Smith, an alumna and a former chair of the trustee board and for another graduate, Joseph H. Daniels Sr., a 31-year campus employee who held numerous key positions during his tenure, including coordinator of the university's Homecoming parade.

The building and conference rooms will be dedicated Friday, October 14, during the Founder's Day program that marks the beginning of Homecoming Weekend. Tours of the residence hall will be conducted over the weekend.

Wilson, who died at the age of 50 on September 5, 1992, was the vice chancellor for student affairs, a position he had held since 1977. He served as interim chancellor during 1984-85 between the administrations of Dr. H. Douglas Covington and Dr. Cleon Thompson Jr.

Wilson, a 1963 graduate of WSSU, was a native of Winston-Salem. He earned a master's in educational

administration from NC A&T State University and a doctorate in education at Southern Illinois University. Before joining WSSU, Wilson taught in the Winston-Salem/Forsyth County School system.

Smith, spent several years on the WSSU's Board of Trustees before assuming the helm from 1984 to 1986. A

retired teacher with the local school system. She was chair of the university's centennial celebration in 1992.

Daniels, who retired last year from WSSU because of ill health, continues to be involved with the university. Over the years, he has worked in student affairs as a recruiter and with residence life.
