The coaching staff, Coach Clark, and assistant coaches Aronda Frenzley and John Clark, will be looking for Nikki Blackwell, Wykesha Broadnax, and Holley Griffin to provide floor leadership, scoring, and defense. Later in the season Rachel Hicks will return with Crystal David to provide experience in the post position. "I feel that Rachel and Wykesha will play a vital role in the inside game," said Clark.

Not only are the Lady Rams a team on the court, but off the court as well. "I don't have to enforce a study hall," said Clark. "The girls do that on their own. They help each other when needed."
