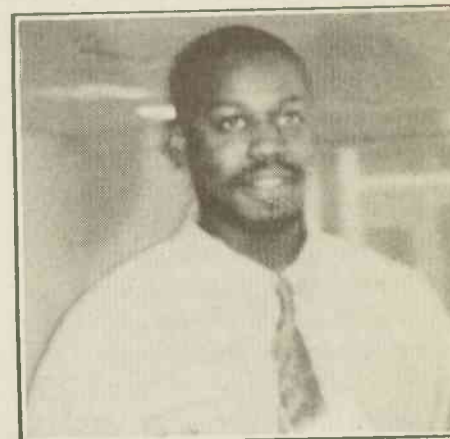

The National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC) will conduct a Collegiate Leadership Summit for Greeks and Non-Greeks at the Hyatt Regency Indianapolis Hotel, One South Capitol Avenue-Indianapolis, Indiana, February 20-23, 1997.

The theme, "Success Through Unity: Strengthening Our Foundations for the New Millennium" was selected to emphasize the importance unity must play in daily campus life and as a requisite to meeting the challenges of the

workplace and in society in the year 2000. The summit will include several workshops focused on the major issues and concerns of collegians.

In addition to the workshops, the summit will feature a "Job Fair" where several major corporations, federal, state and local government agencies have been invited to conduct job interviews. Participants are urged to bring resumes to the conference.

The NPHC will also sponsor a special workshop for university and college advisers. The workshop will be
