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Valley Community College District, athletic director and head basketball coach at West Virginia State College, Charleston, WV, head basketball coach at South Carolina State University, Orangeburg, S.C., assistant men's basketball coach and physical education instructor at Livingston University, Livingston, Ala., and coach and administrator at Miles College, Birmingham, Ala.

While at West Virginia State College, Caldwell was named the West Virginia Conference Coach of the Year in 1990, and Athletic Director of the Year in 1991. He built program funding from \$200,000 in 1987 to \$500,000 in 1988 and continued to build funding to

more than \$1.5 million during his time at WVSC, from 1987 to 1991.

While at Miles College, Caldwell led the basketball team to four consecutive conference championships and advanced to the NCAA Division III NCAA finals once. He was also named Coach of the Year in 1978 by the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.

In addition, he was the college's Teacher of the Year in 1979 and the college's Most Outstanding Administrator in 1977. Caldwell earned his B.S. in Sociology/Psychology at Miles College. He earned an M.A. degree in Health, Physical Education and Recreation from the University of Alabama — Birmingham, and his Ph.D. from Iowa State University, in Ames, Iowa.
