Countries in the U.N. have mixed views about supporting the idea of attacking Iraq.

The U.S. says that it does not need full endorsement from the U.N. to proceed with an attack on Baghdad if inspectors declare that

Iraq is not complying.

Everett said, "There are many countries that may be intimidated by the U.S... I don't think that other countries really agree with how the U.S. is dealing with things."

Elijah Bolin, a senior chemistry major at Wake Forest University, said that he feels there is a lot of apathy on the student's

part. He added that there is much ignorance to the issue, but if students were to discuss it there would probably be a good diversity of opinions.

"You'll find liberals that wholeheartedly disagree with the war," Bolin said. "I have family in the military. We need to come up with a clear reason for the attack. Even if there were;

is preemption a viable reason? The American public has that to decide. I could fall on the side of supporting the attack on Iraq. I believe preemption is good."

Other students have the concern that if we do go to war, there needs to be less public discussion about war strategies and that the current state of

the economy should be considered. The consensus is there should be lessons learned from the '91 war when the U.S. thought they captured Hussein, and from the Afghanistan conflict.

"I think it's necessary for the U.S. to learn better tactics if we are going to

Consequently for this event it did appear that for every good black male there was a few good women behind them as refreshments for the meeting were provided by Delta Sigma Theta Inc.

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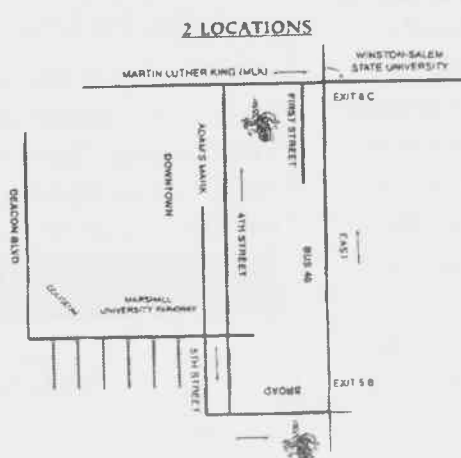
