Despite this remarkable accomplishment, there are still some issues that rema



Over the summer, the Chancellors Office, under Interim Chancellor Michelle Howard-Vital, released the Chancellor's Commission on Community Safety. The report found that most students have a poor or non-existent relationship with the local community and that there is a disconnect between the students and the university faculty and staff. The committee also found there is a lack of school spirit on campus, and also that students don't recognize the importance of reporting illega behavior.


Earlier this year, WSSU ended its two-year-old capital campaign some \$16 million short of its \$35 million goal


