
Experts say prioritizing and time management are key factors in making college life more manageable and enjoyable.

Dr. Jaime Robbins, Human Performance and Sports Science Professor and Sports Psychology consultant, explained how to juggle both academics and athletics. Robbins said that athletes must first manage their time and decide what is important to them.

"Create a ranking system that allows you to decide what is important, whether it's athletics, academics or other extracurricular activities," she said.

Robbins suggests making "to-do" lists of tasks that must be completed before going to bed and tasks that one wants to do.

"Don't let things happen by chance, plan your day. Make time by planning using times and details, and check off the items


