Choral Festival Draws Students From **Around State**

The Methodist College Department of Music hosted a statewide choral festival on Friday, March 26, in Reeves Auditorium. Fourteen elementary, middle school, and high school choruses and show choirs from around Fayetteville and eastern North Carolina participated in this event, which brought almost 1,000 students to the campus throughout the day. Participants visited the Music Department for warm-ups before performing on the stage in Reeves Auditorium in front of the other schools, Methodist College students, and three adjudicators who evaluated them based on singing techniques, choreography, difficulty of music performed, and various other characteristics of their presentations.

Judges for this year's festival included Mrs. Sharon McNair, Mrs. Patti Jordan, and Mrs. Barbara Gear. Mrs. McNair is the choral director at E. E. Smith High School and active participant in community artistic events. Mrs. Jordan is a retired music educator from the Cumberland County school system. Mrs. Geer is a past President of the North Carolina Music Educator's Association, a seasoned veteran of music education, and a widely recognized music and arts education advocate.

All schools participating in this year's festival attained an award of either "Supe-

rior" or "Excellent" and each received a plaque bearing this rating to take back to their respective schools.

Participating Fayetteville area schools included Northwood Temple Academy, Douglas Byrd Middle School, Saint Ann Catholic School, W. T. Brown Elementary School, South View Middle School, Pine Forest Middle School, and Cumberland Mills Elementary School. The Flora MacDonald Academy from Red Springs also attended. Show choirs in attendance included the Cape Fear High School "Pizzaz" from Fayetteville, the Monroe Avenue Elementary School "Royal Singers" from Hamlet, and two choirs, the "Knight Sounds" and "Blues in the Knight," from Northern High School in Durham.

The Methodist College Rainbow's End performed highlights from their Spring Concert for the participants during the festival intermission. Selections included "Trickle, Trickle" by Clarence Bassett, "From A Distance" by Julie Gold, and "Everyday People" by Sylvester Stewart. The Rainbow's End performance was a hit with the festival participants.
