truth that freedom is not free. I call upon our veterans to serve our country in a different by way, teaching a new generation young Americans the importance of the liberties they helped secure.


In respect and recognition of the contributions

A memorandum was sent to on and off campus students to clarify and restate the Methodist College policy concerning illegal substances and illegal use of legal substances on campus.

For over ten years, Methodist College has enforced a "zero tolerance" policy towards illegal substances on campus.

While referring to the 2001-2002 Student Handbook, George Blanc, dean of students, along with several others realized that information concerning the drug policy had been omitted during the printing and publication. Blanc stated that the in-

formation had been included when the copy was sent, but was somehow missed during its printing.

The previous year's "zero tolerance" attitude set a legal precedence for any actions taken during this se-

Blanc wanted students to understand the policy. He sent statements and copies of the policy to every stu-

Last spring eleven people were suspended or expelled from Methodist College under this policy. Only two people have been suspended this semester.

"I'm very, very encouraged by that," stated Blanc

who then stated that club drugs such as GHB (Georgia Home Boy, Grievous Bodily Harm), Ketamine (Special K, Vitamin K), and LSD (Acid, Boomers) were still prevalent on campuses across the na-

Drug paraphernalia is also included in the policy. Drug paraphernalia, including pipes, bongs, and other items, which are used solely for the consumption of illegal substances.

Large amounts of illegal substances are checked on campus through field tests. Smaller amounts, such as residue on drug paraphernalia, are tested by the Fayetteville Police Department.
