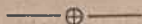


CAN YOU IMAGINE—

Among the highlights in club and campus activities since the last issue of THE PEN are the following events.

Among the visiting guests and assembly speakers was Mr. Gardner, a native of Africa, who was educated in England and is now touring America and making a study of its educational system.

The Chancellors Club presented Dr. Ivan E. Taylor, head of the English Department, as its main speaker at a recent program and forum. The subject of Dr. Taylor's address was, "The Negro In the Post-War Period." This program, which was dedicated to the commemoration of Pearl Harbor Day, also received a few remarks by the

organizer of the Chancellors Club and an honorary poem written by one of the present members.

In keeping with the Civilian Defense program that already exists on our campus, the Zeta Sigma Rho Society initiated a war stamp drive.
